# Highlights

We believe that open science is vital for the sociocultural and economic development of the Arab world, and we therefore want to place accessibility at the heart of the region's scientific and research ecosystems – and encourage the evolution of strong, sustainable open research infrastructures.

We quoted a noted philosopher from the region, Abu Bakr, in our call for papers for this year's Annual Forum: "Without knowledge action is useless, and knowledge without action is futile". This ethos lies at the heart of the Annual Forum – which aims to bring together researchers, librarians, policy makers and university leaders, to support the exchange of actionable insights and practical experiences, and facilitate the development of new collaborative communities and partnerships.

This year's Annual Forum, our third, was held in Doha, at the Qatar National Library who generously agreed to be our host partners, and was undoubtedly the most productive and successful event we have organised so far.

With 21 sessions, 67 speakers, and 1457 delegates from 89 countries (representing 760 institutions) across the world – this was a truly rich event filled with valuable insights, allowing delegates to share ideas, discuss challenges and exchange solutions.

The event was further enriched with two outstanding workshops on the final day for in-person delegates, one for librarians offering an in-depth exploration of how to set up institutional repositories, and the other offering a valuable overview of best practises for engaging with open science in scholarly communications.



But in addition to the scientific programme, we also had a number of other additions to the schedule, including our first Annual General Meeting (to establish the community's objectives for the coming year and elect a temporary Executive Committee) and a Signing Ceremony (to welcome new member organisations joining FORM). We also included a tour of the strikingly beautiful Education City Mosque, and held our Gala Dinner at the fabulous Museum of Islamic Arts in central Doha.

The overarching message of this year's Annual Forum was the prioritisation of communication, collaboration and localisation to ensure the successful advancement of open science policies and practises in the Arab region's research communities and research institutions.

- The need to **communicate** clearly and effectively with each other and with our stakeholders, and the importance of ensuring the arab voice is visible and heard in global discussions.
- The need to **collaborate** as individuals, as institutions, as communities and countries within our local environment and as a region.
- The paramount importance of **localising** discussions, activities, outputs, tools and solutions relating to open science, of encouraging innovation and adaptation to develop processes and policies for individual communities and the region as a whole.

These priorities have also informed our own objectives for the coming year, as we focus on how best to help empower local stakeholders to establish and address local priorities in a manner appropriate to the needs and priorities of their research communities; how we can facilitate the development and implementation of open science policies and practises in research institutions across the region; and what we can do to support the amplification of equitable production of, and equitable access to, research in and from the Arab States.





# **Delegate Overview**


90% of registrants and attendees were online, and 10% in person. 35% of online registrants attended the majority of the event, while 94% of in person delegates attended (this latter drop-off was predominantly due to ongoing political issues in the region impacting travel routes).

Of the 760 institutions which were represented at the event, the majority (68%) were from universities. However, there is evidence of growing interest from healthcare organisations and government policymaking organisations - and both categories saw a significant increase this year.

Of the 1457 delegates and speakers, the majority (43%) were academics and researchers. A further 14% were librarians, and 12% were students (the latter highlights a substantial expansion of interest in open science activities in student populations). The presence of individual open science advocates is also rising.











# **Countries Overview**


The MENA states account for a comfortable majority (67%) of delegates, with the various Asian states also accounting for a further 11% of delegates. Sub Saharan African delegates accounted for 9%, and Europe a further 5%.



The top ten source countries for delegates were predominantly Arab States (most notably the UAE, Qatar, and Egypt - accounting for 22%, 14% and 9% of delegates respectively). However there were also sizeable contingents from Nigeria (5%), India (3%) and Indonesia (3%). Overall the top 10 countries accounted for 67% of the delegates



20 of the 22 Arab states were represented at the conference. The Gulf Cooperation Council countries accounted for 32% of Arab State delegates, Levant Arab nations accounted for a further 26% as did North African Arab nations, while Sub-Saharan Arab nations accounted for just under 16% of Arab state delegates.






# **Content Overview**

Of the 61 speakers, 25 were online (from 17 countries and 22 institutions) and 36 in person (from 9 countries and 27 institutions). Overall, 18 countries and 45 institutions were represented in the scientific programme, providing a broad array of insights and case studies from different regions and perspectives.

The presentations were grouped according to the key priorities of our stakeholders and network: policies and funding; open access publishing and open resources; community building; and open infrastructure (and infrastructures supporting openness). The most popular topic was open access publishing, which saw the highest attendance rates throughout the programme.






